

UAEC 200 COLLEGE READINESS COURSE

UAEC 200 is designed to prepare students for the college experience by teaching them the fundamental skills needed for academic success.

- You and your parents are required to attend the first class meeting (in-person or online).
- You may choose to attend your first class meeting online, on campus or in your local community.
- After the first class meeting, students typically spend four to six hours per week completing this five-week online course.

UAEC 200 is a required, online study skills class that ensures you are ready for college before you enroll in other UA courses. You will earn 2 college credit hours by successfully completing this course.

FOR THE UAEC 200 COLLEGE READINESS COURSE (2-CREDIT COURSE)

The required UAEC 200 course will be offered for free starting in the Fall 2022 semester. This one-of-a-kind course benefits high school students right away by teaching them skills for writing, studying and communicating that are applicable both in their high school careers and when they get to college. Students earn 2 college credit hours from the college readiness class.


OUT-OF-STATE STUDENTS

\$288.75/credit hour Award:25% tuition scholarship Criteria: 3.5+ cumulative high school GPA since ninth grade on a 4.0 scale If a student meets the scholarship criteria, the partial tuition scholarship is automatically applied to the student account for courses approved by UA Early College.

FOR A 3-CREDIT UA ACADEMIC COURSE, THE TUITION WOULD BE:

In-state students: \$577.50 Out-of-state students with scholarship: \$866.25 Out-of-state students with no scholarship: \$1,155.00 (May also incur costs for lab fees and/or textbook)

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR ACCEPTANCE INTO UA EARLY COLLEGE, YOU MUST MEET THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA:

- Possess a cumulative 3.0 GPA in high school since the ninth grade on a 4.0 scale.
- Have completed the ninth grade. You may enroll as soon as you complete ninth grade and continue taking courses through the summer after your senior year. However, applying sooner will provide you with more benefits.

HOW CAN I PARTICIPATE IN SUMMER ON CAMPUS?

- Be admitted to UA Early College
- ✓ Have successfully passed the UAEC 200 College Readiness Course before the summer term begins
- Complete the free Summer On Campus application (available through UAEC Student Resources once the UAEC 200 class is complete)



Enroll in two classes

- that's 6 or 7 credit hours - per summer term. Classes meet Monday through Friday.



Live with other UA Early College students,

as well as peer coaches and staff in a secure-entry, staffed 24-hour front desk residence hall. One of the newest residence halls on campus, John England Jr. Hall, offers a hybrid/ traditional style and is centrally located next to Lakeside Dining Hall.



Develop good study habits

at mandatory study hall and visit the Capstone Center for Student Success to enhance your academic skills.



Work out at the recreation center,

participate in a variety of on-campus activities, and meet your friends at the campus coffee shop or dining facilities.



Use Dining Dollars on your Action Card

for vending and campus dining.

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Use the on-campus transportation system

or rent a bicycle. If you bring a car to campus, you will have a designated parking lot for your vehicle.

Students may leave campus on weekends using the parent check-out system.

Students may participate in Summer On Campus during Summer I, Summer II or both sessions. Typically, Summer I is the month of June and Summer II is the month of July.

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST TO LIVE ON CAMPUS FOR A SUMMER TERM?

Students will be living in John England Jr. Hall. Below is an approximation. Final cost depends on your partial tuition scholarship, the number of credit hours you take and optional purchases.
