AP & Dual Enrollment: The Main Differences

- Both are types of **college accelerator** programs
 - High School students get a head start on a college career
- Both offer **college-level courses**

The Main Difference: The *Organization offering* the College Level Course



What is AP?



- **Organization: College Board**

- 19 AP Courses (AP Psychology & AP Art History - ACCESS)
- Standardized curriculum across all states
- Class is audited by College Board for standardization
- SAT/PSAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying = Developed by College Board
- ACT Skill Development is a crucial part of all AP courses
- Completion of the class requires taking the AP Exam
- College credit is possible with a Qualifying Score (3) on the AP Exam
 - Check your chosen college/university for acceptance of AP scores
- Fees for AP Exams: Approximately \$100 per exam

Reasons to Take AP Classes



- Strengthen your college application/resume: Admissions & Scholarships
- Highest GPA Boost of all high school classes, 1 full GPA point. Rise to the Top!
- Earn early college credit (depending on exam score and institution)
- Get acquainted with college level work
- Rigorous coursework excellent “college skill development” Ex. AP Chemistry
- College Board trained, PHS teacher
- Traditional classroom daily instruction on PHS campus
- Study what you LOVE in depth
- Less expensive than Dual Enrollment

What is your Goal? College Major?

- **Example #1:**

- **History Teacher (Pre-Law)**

- Major: Political Science/History/English

- **AP Classes Taken in High School:**

- AP US History/AP Government/Economics/AP Lit/AP Lang
- Skill development for college major
- Depth of knowledge for college major

- **Dual Enrollment Classes Taken in High School:**

- Math/Biology/Intro Spanish I, etc.
- Not your strongest subjects but required for college diploma
- Not needed for your college major but required for diploma



What is your Goal? College Major?

- **Example #2:**

- **Mechanical Engineer**

- Major: Engineering

- **AP Classes Taken in High School:**

- AP Calculus/AP Physics/AP Statistics
- Skill development for college major
- Depth of knowledge for college major

- **Dual Enrollment Classes Taken in High School:**

- English 101/History 201/Intro Spanish I, etc.
- Not your strongest subjects but required for college diploma
- Not needed for your college major but required for diploma





Important to Know about AP Classes:



- If you receive a qualifying score on the AP Exam and you are granted college credit:
 - The weight/grade will NOT be counted in your college GPA.
 - Credit will be received but NOT calculated into your starting college GPA.
- **Significance:**
 - You saved **time and money** by receiving college credit!
 - Because you “skipped” the less difficult course and received AP credit, you did NOT receive an “A” or 4.0 to “**pad**” your college GPA.
 - You will begin your college GPA with a potentially more difficult class and a mathematically **sensitive** college GPA.



What is Dual Enrollment?



- DE College Options: Auburn First, Jeff State, Montevallo, UAB, and UA Early College.
- Opportunity for students to earn BOTH high school & college credit. (Ex. ENG 101 covers the English 11 requirement)
- Students will begin their college transcript by taking DE and their college transcript will follow them to any college they attend. It is vitally important for students to take these classes seriously.
- DE classes are weighted with an extra .5 weight. AP classes are weighted with an extra 1 point weight.
- Typical cost for 1 course - \$450 - \$640



Things to consider:



Deadline are DEADLINES and each college professor's policy is different.

Due to FERPA laws, only the student can contact their professor, see their grades, etc. (UA will contact Mrs. Self if grade is below an 80.)

PHS faculty cannot contact college professors for your student. Communication is solely between the student and professor.

In most cases, DE students can take advantage of the resources that the regular college students are offered - tutoring, writing center, etc.

DE students are eligible for Early Out/In, but they MUST be off campus during the period(s) scheduled for Early Out/In.

Do not take your first DE class during the summer!

Transcript Integrity



- **ALL DE classes are entered on BOTH the high school AND college transcript, even if the student fails or doesn't do well in the DE class.**
- **If a student fails a DE class, they may have to take the corresponding equivalent credit the next semester in order to get the required graduation credit and/or to be eligible to play athletics the following school year.**
- **Also, if a student fails a DE course, they aren't allowed to enroll in a DE course the next semester.**





Typical 10th Grade Courses

- **US 103/201 during the 1st semester of 10th grade (Earns 1 credit)**
- **US 104/202 during the 2nd semester of 10th grade (Earns 1 credit)**
- **These 2 courses are the equivalency of US 10 & US 11 History requirements, so students wouldn't take US 10 or US 11 at PHS**
- **Students will be scheduled 1 period in a computer lab during their day to work on their online US 101 & US 102 courses**
- **If the student passes these courses, they will not take a history during 11th grade.**
- **The US 10 & 11 equivalent courses are NOT offered through Auburn First**
- **Depending on the student's schedule, a student may also take an elective course through DE**

Typical 11th Grade Courses



- **ENG 101 during the 1st semester of 11th grade (Earns 1 credit)**
- **ENG 102 during the 2nd semester of 11th grade (Earns 1 credit)**
- **These 2 courses are the equivalency of English 11 & 12 requirements, so students wouldn't take English 11 or 12 at PHS**
- **Students will be scheduled 1 period in a computer lab during their day to work on their online ENG 101 & 102 courses**
- **ENG 101 & 102 are offered ONLINE ONLY for 2023-2024**
- **If the student passes these courses, they will not take an English during 12th grade.**
- **Depending on the student's schedule, a student may also take an elective course through DE**

12th Grade Options

12TH GRADE
Seniors

This is dependent upon if they have been taking DE classes, or if they are beginning in 12th grade. Students/parents can discuss with Mrs. Self what classes they are interested in and which one would be best for their child depending on where they want to attend college, what they want to major in, etc.

*****Avoid taking a graduation requirement the Spring Term of the senior year.**

*****If a student takes Microeconomics or Macroeconomics at the college level, they must complete Career Prep-B through ACCESS.**

Dual Enrollment Course Registration Timeline:

College course options are not available until a couple of months before the term begins.

Registration for Dual Enrollment courses should take place as follows:

Fall courses: April/May (For PHS course selection purposes, please list the courses on your Course Selection form, but the college's registration process is completely SEPARATE from this process. Students must follow the college's instructions for registration. 1. Online application 2. Signature Page/Cover Memo/Approval Letter, etc. must be sent to the college with a transcript.)

Spring courses: October/November

Summer courses: February/March



Tuition - Due at the beginning of each semester

Difference in High School and College Classes

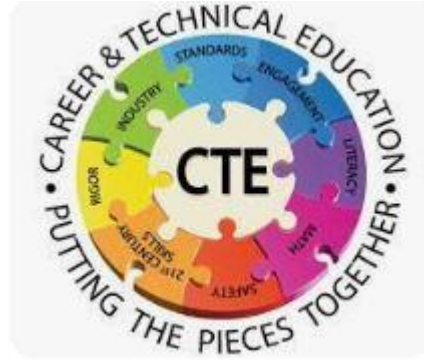
While many dual enrollment classes run the whole school year at the high school, they are in fact two separate college classes.

A student taking English 11 or 12 will be enrolled in a full academic year of English at the high school. However, for DE classes, the student will be enrolled in ENG 101 in the fall semester and ENG 102 in the spring semester. (Ex. 1 credit for ENG 101 in December and 1 credit for ENG 102 in May.)

Payment for ENG 101 is due at the beginning of the fall semester and payment for ENG 102 is due at the beginning of the spring semester.
